## LITERACY FOR ALL

### MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT & CEO

Does the launch of a new school year bring up powerful memories for you as it does for me? I have been in a flurry of activity as my daughter begins her senior year as a high school student. Remember buying supplies, uniforms and school outfits, and finishing up summer reading assignments?

The new school year is even more meaningful to me as my son steps into his first year as a full-time teacher. Coincidentally, he is teaching the same grade level (7th grade) I started with many moons ago! I taught American History and English. He will be teaching American History; and as you can imagine, I let him know he is also a reading teacher. We spent time together this summer talking about his responsibility to apprentice students in the literacy of his content area. Of course, this summer also included an investment in Developing Metacognitive Strategies – his first NEC professional development experience!

We also talked about the critical mass of children reading below the proficient level among public, charter, and private schools. In 2019, the national percentage of fourth-grade public school students performing at or above the National Assessment or Education Progress (NAEP) proficient level in reading was only 34 percent. Across the United States, the

percentage of public school fourth-graders performing at or above NAEP proficient in reading ranged from 24 percent to 49 percent. We can either shrug our shoulders collectively and accept status quo as a community, or we can look at upstream issues that have led to an inefficient, high-cost, low-return model of educating our children and adults.

Thank you for your part in advancing a lower-cost, high-yield model that ensures literacy for all through the amazing NEC team in partnership with dedicated educators who believe in applying evidence-based practices. The upstream dynamic I am the most excited about is our focus on partnering with universities willing to grapple with how we reinvent the way teachers and leaders are apprenticed for the right work! When educators are set up for success with a focus on becoming diagnostic and prescriptive in their practice, regardless of their role, it changes everything!

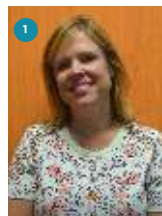

# DYSLEXIA AWARENESS

Each year, October is recognized worldwide as Dyslexia Awareness Month, a time to come together to raise awareness, share resources, and tell stories about dyslexia successes. Diagnosed at an early age, **Avery Martin** was embarrassed to learn she had dyslexia, but with the support from her family, especially her mother, **Paige Martin**, she has learned to focus on her strengths and embrace her learning difference.

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**Avery, you were diagnosed with having dyslexia in elementary school. How have your feelings evolved throughout the years?**

When I was younger, I was scared and embarrassed, and I didn't want anyone to know I was diagnosed with dyslexia. I could tell my parents were upset and that they weren't sure what to do. Luckily, with the support of some great teachers and a dyslexia specialist, they advised my parents and shared valuable resources. My mom found Neuhaus Education Center and was able to get me a tutor outside of school, which helped a lot. Now, I am not embarrassed about it at all. My family and I don't see dyslexia as a disability, and we don't see it as a gift - dyslexia to us is a learning difference. Everyone has a learning style; mine just has a label.

**What are your strengths and how have you improved when it comes to learning?**

As a creative person, I find myself great at memorizing and storytelling. If I can tell you my answers verbally, I am great, and you can see how much I know about a subject. I have also learned how to stay organized and limit after school activities so I can schedule time to study. To improve on my struggles with spelling and reading, I type often so I can use spellcheck, listen to texts, and watch videos about information to fill in the blanks on things that I am studying.

**What advice or words of encouragement would you give to others who have learned they have dyslexia?**

Focus on what you CAN do, not what is HARD. Having dyslexia is challenging, but you can do anything that you set your mind to. And, find something that you are good at that you love outside of school.

For me, I love theatre, and it has motivated me to work hard at reading so I can read the scripts and memorize lines. If you have something that you really love, you will find a way to do it.

**As a parent, Paige, you are invaluable, serving as a role model and providing a family support network. Some parents can be quite lost when it comes to finding ways to cope with their children's learning difficulties. How did the Neuhaus Education Center provide support?**

Neuhaus was instrumental in getting me information on dyslexia, what steps we needed to take, and where to find additional help. Neuhaus also has amazing classes that we have taken part in, and we were able to get information on additional tutoring outside of school. We were given a list of tutors in our area and we were able to begin with the Orton-Gillingham program and get a head start before she began getting additional help at school.

**What advice or words of encouragement would you give parents?**

It is very difficult to watch your child struggle. You never want your child to have a hard time with anything, but don't give up. Your child is smart and capable. You just have to find what motivates them and the strategies that help them learn the way their brain needs to. Reach out and ask questions. Find someone that you can talk to. In my opinion, people with dyslexia not only learn differently, but they also think differently. With the right support team, you can do it.

*Home is where literacy takes root, and when a child struggles with reading, the search for answers and specialists trained in detecting learning difference can be difficult and intimidating. Neuhaus resources and referral services provide families with a welcome first step in unlocking a path to reading success. We're here to help! ### **ON HER POSITION AT NEUHAUS...**

Karol Ann has been at NEC for just over a year as a content writer. She is a recent Ph.D. graduate from Texas A&M University with an endorsement in Advanced Research Methods. With strong ties to the Texas A&M research community and beyond, Moore also has seven research papers published in research journals and has spoken to various audiences on dyslexia identification, reading comprehension, teacher knowledge, and orthography.

As the Director of Research she will be coordinating and managing third-party research, identifying relevant research that supports the work and mission of NEC, and conducting research to provide NEC with qualitative data to inform and support programming. In addition to this role, Moore will also be assuming the responsibilities of Associate Vice President of Curriculum and Instructional Design by managing program development.

## STAFF SPOTLIGHT

**DR. KAROL ANN MOORE, PH.D., LDT, CALT, SLDS**



### **ON HER CURRENT RESEARCH...**

Languages are classified as transparent or opaque based on the complexity of their letter-sound correspondences. Finnish and Spanish are transparent languages because their sounds and symbols are very consistent, unlike English where we have 26 letters and 44 speech sounds that can have more than 200 variations for reading. Thus, English is a complex and opaque language. In my current research, I look at these characteristics and how they contribute to reading acquisition, including informing the way we identify dyslexia, especially when students come to us from a different language background. Shifts in the field of dyslexia to use models that account for ecological factors such as language and instruction are being promoted to more effectively identify students with dyslexia.

### **PROMOTING LITERACY FOR ALL...**

This fall, I will attend and conduct a presentation with Dr. Malt Joshi from Texas A&M University and Dr. Rui Alves from the University of Porto in Portugal at the International Academy for Research on Learning Disabilities (IARLD) in Oviedo, Spain. Dr. Joshi also serves on the Neuhaus Education Center National Advisory Council.

My presentation will discuss employing a dimensional framework to identify dyslexia using the Ten Dimensions proposed by Daniels and Share in 2018, and how the structure of a language might affect the variation in reading abilities and dyslexia.

### LITERACY TEXAS AWARD

A Neuhaus Education Center adult literacy student has received the 2022 Literacy Texas Annual Award for the second time. Nominated by her NEC instructor Carol Ciampi, who wrote the glowing nomination, **Chau Hua** was recognized as the student award winner for "Student Achievement in ABE/HSE" across the state of Texas.

Chau's story is one of a child growing up in a multi-generational family, all living together in a small house or apartment. She went through some rough times in her life during her adolescence but found a career as a hairdresser as a young adult.

Although she has been a small business owner, having her own salon for quite a few years, she still yearned for the knowledge she felt she had missed in school during her youth. Chau started taking literacy courses at Neuhaus Education Center a few years ago; and during that time, she was also reading different books of interest at home to increase her vocabulary and comprehension skills.

After making the decision to start taking courses at the college level, Chau was determined to choose the college or university that would meet her needs. She took the time to visit different campuses, meeting with different people to discuss her plans and ask questions.



Chau selected the University of Houston-Downtown and has taken a course in writing, knowing that it was an area of weakness and that she wanted to improve. Chau's drive to learn is evident in her attendance and participation in class. She has become a life-long learner who recently completed a course in writing at University of Houston-Downtown.
