What if Houston became the most literate city in the nation? What if children with dyslexia were identified before they experienced reading failure? What if systems were designed in every public, charter, and private school to ensure a literacy safety net was in place for educators to get reading right the first time?

These compelling questions underscore a problem that many may not be fully aware of: Houston, like our nation, is confronting a literacy crisis.

The National Assessment of Education Progress (NAEP) provides a nationally consistent measure of our literacy progress. Despite abundant scientific knowledge on effective reading instruction, a staggering 68% of U.S. fourth graders are not proficient in reading. The challenges brought about by the COVID-19 pandemic in 2022 have only worsened this decline, and the consequences are profound.

As we prepare our children for a knowledge-based economy and an information age, their decoding and fluency skills must be strong to enable them to build knowledge effectively. Beyond childhood, digital, health, and financial literacy are vital skills. Failing to equip our children with these competencies will leave them ill-prepared to navigate the complex web of literacy in a world that continually evolves. We must recognize that we are all in this together – we either collectively swim toward literacy excellence or sink as a society.

UNDIAGNOSED:

The Ugly Side of Dyslexia

Born to humble beginnings in New Orleans, Ameer Baraka's early life was as gloomy and as ill-fated as a young life could have been. In and out of the prison system as a kid for transgressions ranging from youthful indiscretions to major crimes, he was seemingly on a one-way trip to oblivion.

Almost illiterate when he went to prison, he was diagnosed with dyslexia and learned to read in his mid-twenties while behind bars. His book, <u>UNDIAGNOSED:</u> <u>The Ugly Side of Dyslexia</u> promotes early detection of the learning disability in schools and awareness and support for prison inmates in the United States.

Ameer Baraka is an Emmy® Award-nominated and daytime actor, author, and dyslexia advocate. He is currently working on Tyler Perry's number one tv show Zatima on BET-plus.

My literacy journey with Neuhaus Education Center

Overcoming personal struggles and difficulty with reading, Tameka Blackshire discovered the power of education and found the courage to seek help with support from Neuhaus in her pursuit of a brighter future.

I am delighted to share my transformative journey with Neuhaus, a journey that not only changed my life but also brought a positive shift to my son's life. It's a story of facing challenges, seeking help, and discovering the power of learning anew.

To be completely honest, there was a time when I found myself in a low place, struggling not only with my own understanding but also with my son's challenges. My son had been diagnosed with dyslexia, and the struggles he faced in school echoed deeply within me. I carried the weight of feeling like I had let him down.

The turning point came when I stumbled upon the Neuhaus Adult Literacy program. It was a moment of bravery when I thought, "What could possibly go wrong?" I reached out to the staff from the Family Support & Adult Literacy Office and that conversation marked the first time

I openly shared my struggles with reading comprehension. The reassuring words were like a lifeline, assuring me that I wasn't alone in this journey. Several months later, an appointment was scheduled and it was a pivotal step that filled me with excitement. The prospect of learning alongside my 11-year-old son was invigorating. Despite the hardships we were facing, the chance to make our lives better gave me the strength to persevere. As the program unfolded, I found myself surrounded by amazing classmates. The learning environment became a safe haven for growth. My newfound understanding led me to embrace a different approach to teaching my son. I invited him to help me with my studies, a role reversal that nurtured a deeper bond between us.

Among the many impactful aspects of the Neuhaus program, I can hold my head high now, confident in my reading abilities. Most importantly, I can support my son's reading journey and help him recognize his progress.

My advice to other adults unable to move forward in life because of a struggle with reading is this – if you find yourself doubting, unsure if seeking help is the right path, let my journey be a testament to the power of taking that leap. Neuhaus Education Center took a chance on me, and it changed my life.

New Dyslexia Law House Bill 3928

This law relates to dyslexia evaluations and services for Texas public school student, the provision of services for students with dyslexia and related disorders, and certain parental notice regarding the rights of parents of public-school students with disabilities.

Reading or writing letters backward.



FACT

Reversing letters is part of a child's development. If your child is still reversing letters by the end of first grade or later, this could indicate the need for further investigation.

MYTH

Dyslexia is rare.

FACT

The prevalence of dyslexia is estimated to be between 5-20%. Approximately 80% of students in Special Education have a reading-related learning disability.



MYTH

Dyslexia cannot be identified until 3rd grade

FACT

Characteristics of dyslexia can be identified early. In fact, early identification is key so that students receive ample time for appropriate intervention. Many states have enacted legislation requiring all Kindergarten and Grade 1 students to be screened for dyslexia.

MYTH

Dyslexia goes away once children learn to read.

FACT

While appropriate intervention can greatly benefit students with dyslexia in obtaining the necessary skills for reading, dyslexia is a lifelong learning difference.

MYTH

Kids with dyslexia just need to work harder.

FACT

It is not the effort, but the type of intervention and instruction that moves the needle for students with dyslexia.

MYTH

Dyslexia only occurs in the English language.

FACT

Dyslexia has been studied in most languages and around the world. Given the structure of the language, dyslexia may look a little different; however, it is not identified in English alone.

MYTH

Dyslexia is a vision issue.

FACT

Dyslexia is <u>not</u> a vision issue.

fMRI studies of the brain have shown the differences between students with and without dyslexia exist in the pathways where reading develops in the brain. Intervention can help students with dyslexia to create new pathways that enable them to develop necessary reading skills.



FACT

Dyslexia does not discriminate.

It can be identified in people of all backgrounds, intellectual levels, and stages of life. People with dyslexia can be very intelligent and are often gifted in areas such as art, computer science, design, drama, electronics, math, mechanics, music, physics, sales, and sports.

FACT

Dyslexia can be hereditary.

Parents with dyslexia are likely to have children with dyslexia.


